
Several activities to learn about Japanese culture at Hiroshima Art Museum

Kagura is a type of traditional Japanese theater which Hiroshima is particularly famous for. The Japanese spoken in kagura is so old that even most Japanese audiences don't understand it. However, at this recurring



event at the Hiroshima Prefectural Citizens' Cultural Center, not only did we get subtitles in very clear English, but after the show there was a Q&A session with the cast and a translator. So, by the end of the night, we may have understood the story better than some Japanese people. Lastly, we were allowed onstage to take pictures with the cast

and try on some of their costumes, which are heavier than they look!
