Fall is finally here! That means delicious seasonal food, beautiful autumn leaves, and the annual International Festival that's held in Peace Memorial Park inside and around the International Conference Center Hiroshima (ICCH) building! This is the second year I will participate in this 16-year-strong festival, and I can assure you there are lots of interesting things to eat, learn about, and experience through hands-on workshops. This post is to share my insight on the goings-on, and encourage you to go see everything for yourself on Sunday, Nov. 15, from 10 AM - 4 PM.

Each year, the International Festival is a way for Hiroshima City residents to learn about different citizen groups that are involved in exchange and cooperation abroad. There are several dozen groups that volunteer to staff a booth about their activities or to lead a workshop of their own design. This year, we have workshops in Chinese rope braiding, yuzen and katazome fabric dyeing, and ikebana flower arrangement.

In addition to workshops, there are also areas just for plain fun! For example, I will be staffing a coloring table for Northwest Native American art-inspired designs. Also on the 1st basement level of the Conference Center will be four craft areas staffed by local expats originating from Barbados, Canada, China, and the U.S. These areas are all friendly to children and adult visitors alike, so feel free to come by and relax for a while! ©

For some hands-on events such as a kimono-wearing experience, English tour guide seminar, and the aforementioned ikebana workshop, reservations must be made ahead-of time. If you're interested in one or more of these events, call the International

Another important thing to mention are the *yatai*, or food booths. Just in front of the Conference Center on the grass-filled area alongside Peace Boulevard are a couple dozen different food vendors-almost all of which offer a different country's cuisine! Last year, there were booths specializing in Korean, Chinese, Indian, Thai, American, and several other cuisines, almost all at cheaper prices than you regularly find at festivals.

In short, the International Festival has it all—food,

fun, and invaluable opportunities to connect with Japanese and expats alike. Come enjoy! ^^
